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Invasive Species Programs

- Invasive plant treatments at **8.5 sq. mile** are part of the Modified Water Delivery project, which will have a 75%/25% cost share with the SFWMD, both for initial treatment as well as long term maintenance. 1,953 acre project.
- Invasive plant treatments at **Site 1** are part of the CERP and have a 50%/50% cost share with the SFWMD , both for initial treatment as well as long term maintenance. 1,800 acre project.

- Luziola (kinda new - 8.5sq. mile only)

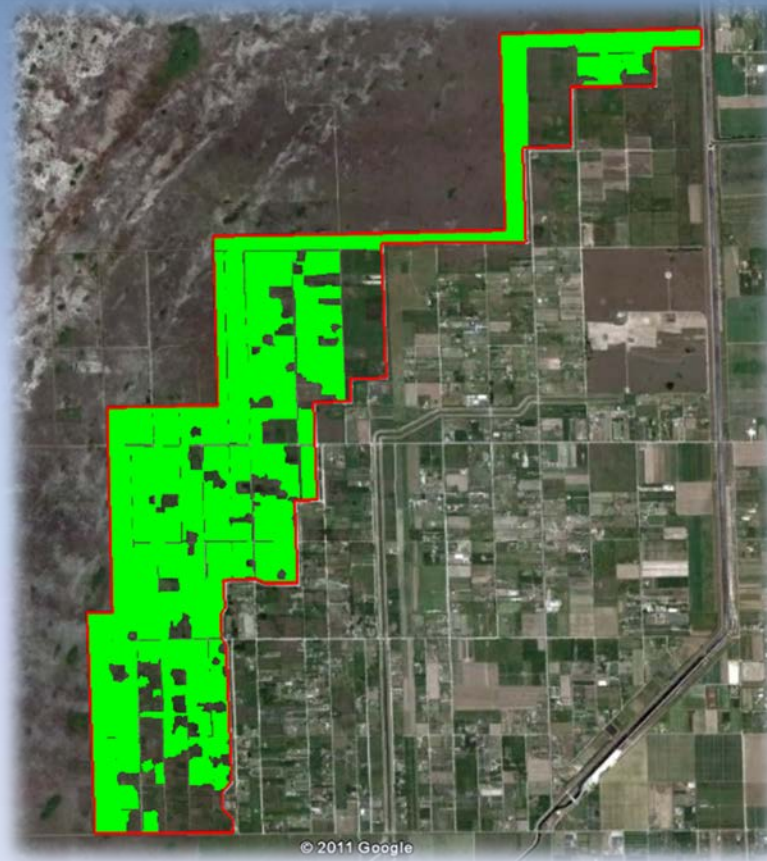

Location Map



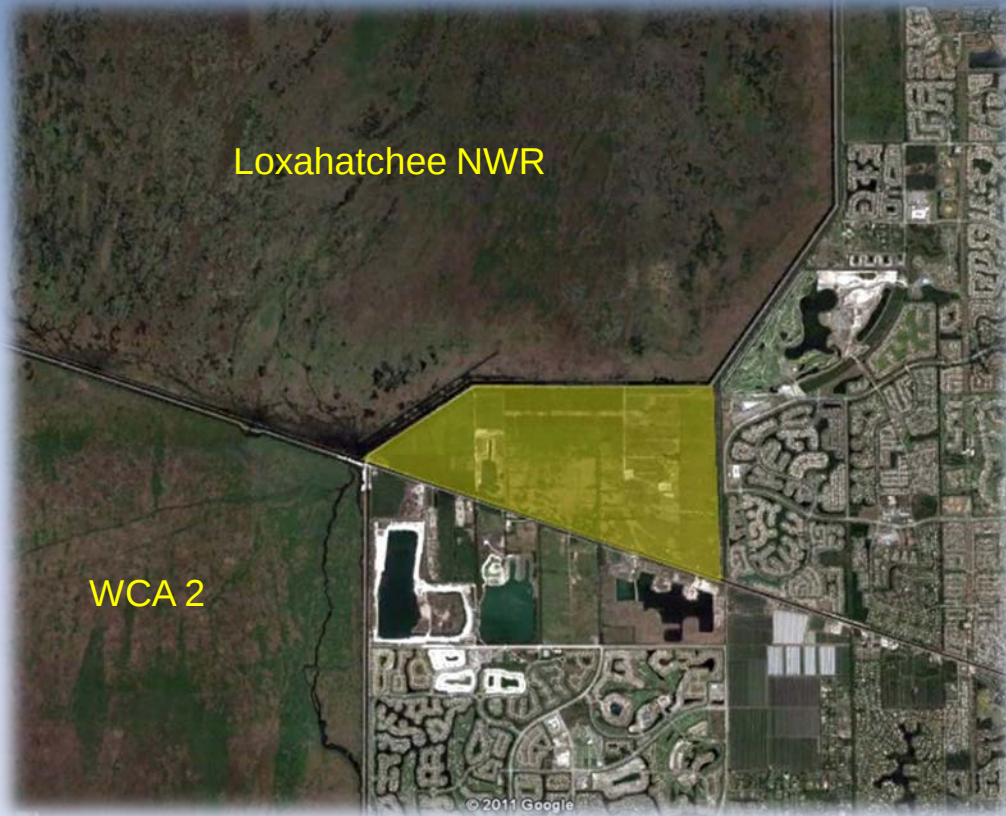
Fiscal Year Treatments 8.5 sq. mile: FY10



 Treatment Area

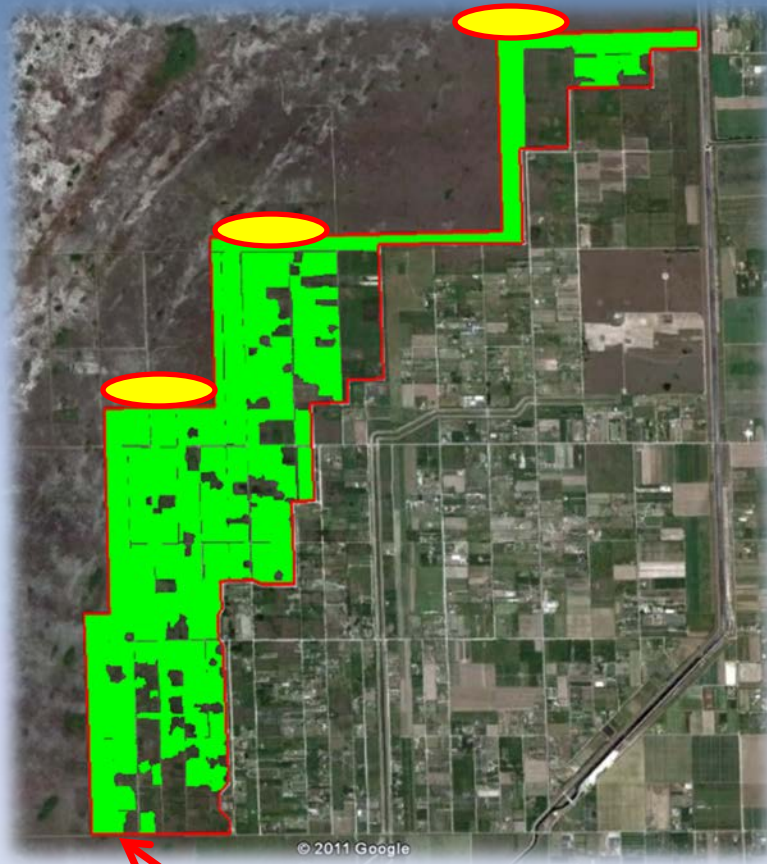
- 5/09 – 10/09 – treated 1,433 acres
- All non-treated area is considered to be disturbed and will need to be scraped (i.e. Hole-in-the-Donut). 474 acres

Fiscal Year Treatments Site 1: FY11



- Initiated treatment on September 2010
- 462 acres of dense non-native invasive vegetation
- \$\$ for next phase of treatments are on hold pending SFWMD concurrence.

Planned Treatments 8.5 sq. mile: FY11



- Follow up treatment on 1433 acres
- Initial Treatment on 180 acres
- 4.8 acres mechanical removal of Australian pine

Innovations and Successes

- Decontamination of own equipment and contractor equipment should have been a requirement for the project. *Luziola subintegra* was found in a small area on the project. The plant had only been found previously at Lake Okeechobee. As a result, we incorporated decontamination specifications into our next invasive species removal project, Site 1 Impoundment Project which is a Comprehensive Everglades Restoration Project. This was the first project for the Jacksonville District that included the decontamination specifications.

Wrap Up Slide
