## Invasive Species to Watch Out For

### Orange Hawkweed (Hieracium aurantiacum)

**Appearance**: A perennial plant that is 11.8-23.6 in. tall and produces a milky sap.

**Foliage**: Leaves are mostly at the base of the plant, elliptical, 2-8 in. long, 0.4-1.2 in. wide and covered with short, stiff, black hairs. There can be 10-30 flowering steams that can grow up to 2 ft. tall.

**Flowering Head**: Flowers are orange to red and are in compact clusters of 5 or more dandelion-like flowers on short hairy stalks at the top of plants.

**Fruit/Seeds**: Fruit is a dark seed with a tuft of white hair to be carried in the wind.

#### Oxeye Daisy

(Laucanthemum vulgare)

**Appearance**: A perennial herb that can reach 1-3 ft. tall.

**Foliage**: Leaves at the base of the plant are spoon-shaped. Leaves on the stem are alternate, 1-4 in. long, toothed (or lobed) and decrease in size closer to the top of the stem.

**Flowering Head**: Produces 1-40 flowering stems with daisy-like yellow and white flower heads, 1-2 in. across.

**Fruit/Seeds**: Each flower head can produce up to 200 flat seeds that are 0.08in. long.

Yellow Toadflax (Linaria vulgaris)


**Appearance**: A perennial herb that can reach 3.3 ft. tall with several erect, smooth stems.

**Foliage**: Leaves are drooping, linear, and 1-2 in. long.

**Flowering Head**: Yellow/white, snapdragon-like flowers, 0.6-1.2 in. long including the spur, develop in a spike at the tops of the stems.

**Fruit/Seeds**: Capsules 0.4-0.5 in. long with small, flat blackish seeds with a papery wing.

#### **Common Mullein**

(Verbascum thapsus)

**Appearance**: A biennial forb, unbranched, and can grow to more than 6.6 ft. tall.

**Foliage**: First year plants develop as a rosette with leaves that are 4-12 in. long, 1-5 in. wide and covered with woolly hairs. Second year leaves are alternate and decrease in size towards the top of the stem.

**Flowering Head**: Five-petaled, yellow flowers are in a dense spike at the top of the stem the second year. Plants die after flowering.

**Fruit/Seeds:** An ovoid capsule that splits, releasing 100,000 to 180,000 seeds
