Invasive Species to Watch Out For

False brome (*Brachypodium* spp.)

Appearance: Tufted annual or perennial bunchgrasses that grow up to 6 ft. tall and have an erect or nodding form.

Foliage: Leaves are bright green to bluegreen, 0.25-0.3 in. wide and 0.25-12 in. long, and may have a fringe of hairs around the leaf margins.

Flowering Head: Flowers on 1.5-8 in. long drooping spikes.

Fruit: Small and attached to an awn (long, threadlike bristle).

Japanese Knotweed (Reynoutria japonica)

Appearance: A dense growing, highly branched, deciduous, perennial shrub reaching up to 10 ft. tall.

Foliage: Leaves are alternate on zig-zagging stems, 6 in. long, 3-4 in. wide, and broadly-ovate on hollow stems and emerging from raised nodes.

Flowering Head: Small, greenish-white flowers develop in long, upright clusters where the leaves meet the stem.

Fruit/Seeds: Reproduces both vegetatively from rhizomes (creeping rootstalks) and small, black seeds.

Parrotfeather (Myriophyllum aquaticum)

Appearance: An herbaceous, rooted, submerged to emergent (rising above the water) aquatic plant that is over 5 ft. long.

Foliage: Leaves are bright blue-green, abundant, whorled in 4-6 leaves around the stem, pinnately compound (leaf is made up of many smaller leaflets), and finely dissected.

Flowering Head: Reproduction occurs vegetatively. Inconspicuous flowers are formed where the leaves meet the stems of the emergent (above water) leaves in the spring.


Fruit/Seeds: No fertile fruit is known in the US.

(Lythrum salicaria)

Appearance: A tall, multistemmed (30-50 per plant), perennial forb that can grow up to 10 ft. tall.

Purple loosestrife

Foliage: Leaves are opposite or whorled on the stem, dark-green, lance shaped, lacking a leaf stem, 1.5-4 in. long and round or heart-shaped at the base.

Flowering Head: Pink to purplish flowers have 5-7 petals and develop in 4-16 in. long spikes at the tops of the stems.

Fruit/Seeds: Capsules that are enclosed in the hairy sepals and contain several reddish brown seeds.

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
